In the past I have given lectures on the supply of electrical energy to Austria ("Where does Austria's electricity come from?"). I involved experts from the water industry, the wind industry and energy policy, among others. I only gave a lecture on the climate problem in a single lecture hour. Can an old physicist dare to intrude on climate policy and present his view unprotected?

As an unknown among the many climate scientists, it is bold to comment on climate policy, but perhaps naivety and not belonging to the mainstream is sometimes an advantage.

I write against the ideologies and against the "hyps", i.e. the expectations of very quick miracles that my colleagues will achieve. I try to bring physics and common sense (you can also call it naive mind) into the discussion. I'm hardly getting any official reactions, but maybe some things will trickle down. I sometimes have this impression.
