3 pre-doctoral positions (4 years, 30 hrs/week)

(ERC-funded project 'DEPART: The de-party-politicization of Europe's political elites', PI: Laurenz Ennser-Jedenastik)

The Department of Government at the University of Vienna invites applications for three 4-year pre-doctoral positions in the ERC Starting Grant project DEPART, headed by Laurenz Ennser-Jedenastik. The project investigates how the careers of political elites in 30 European democracies have changed since 1945 and how this affects policy outcomes and political accountability. Successful applicants will be enrolled in the Vienna Doctoral School of Social Sciences ([ViDSS](#)) and complete their PhD thesis as part of the project.

The Department of Government is a vibrant political science department dedicated to excellence in research and teaching and a friendly and cooperative work environment. In addition, it is located in one of the world's best cities.

The three positions:

- **Position 1** is situated in DEPART's work package 1 (WP1) which collects and quantifies data on ministerial biographies on a large scale to analyze long-term changes in the careers of political elites in 30 European democracies. The researcher will have a strong interest in political parties and political elites, solid skills in quantitative methods, and the motivation to build on them (e.g. sequence analysis, event history analysis).
- **Position 2** is situated in work package 2 (WP2) which takes the biographical data produced in WP1, aggregates them, and examines what effect ministers' changing biographical backgrounds have had on policy outputs in Europe since 1945. The researcher will have a strong interest in how political actors affect public policy. He/she will possess solid quantitative skills and the motivation to build on them (e.g. multi-level models).
- **Position 3** is situated in DEPART's work package 3 (WP3) which uses existing observational data and survey experiments (to be designed by the researcher under the supervision of the PI) to examine the impact of political elite biographies on voting behavior and political accountability. The researcher will have a strong interest in how political elites shape voting behavior. He/she will possess solid quantitative skills and the motivation to build on them (e.g. survey experimental design).

General job description:

- Conducting and publishing high-quality research within the framework of DEPART
- Collaborating closely with other researchers in the project (PI, post-doc, pre-docs, student coders)
- Disseminating results from the PhD thesis at international conferences and in high-quality outlets
- Presenting research output from the PhD thesis in departmental seminars
- Starting date: 1 March 2021 for positions 1 and 3, and 1 September 2021 for position 2 (a later start is possible)
- Salary: approx. €31,000 (before taxes), which works out to approx. €1,600/month net (14 times/year) for a 30h/week workload;

Your profile:

- MA degree (or equivalent) in political science or a related discipline (completed or close to completion)
- Research interests as described above
- Strong quantitative skills, excellent command of Stata and/or R
- Willingness to acquire new methodological skills required for the project and PhD thesis (e.g. sequence analysis, life course analysis, event history analysis, multilevel models, TSCS models, design of survey experiments). Funds for methods training (e.g. summer or winter schools) will be available.
- Excellent command of English (written and spoken)
- Ability and willingness to collaborate in a team
- Knowledge (even intermediate-level) of any EU language except for German, English, French, Dutch, Swedish, and Danish is an asset.
